Following this experience, she spent the 2019-20 academic year studying at the University of Freiburg in Germany through a direct enrollment program. Abigail was fortunate enough to be able to stay there through the pandemic as she had family and friends who lived outside of Freiburg. These experiences led her to apply for a Fulbright ETA award in Nepal, which she feels would be a great opportunity to explore her academic interests and gain some professional experiences to determine whether she wants to pursue graduate school or start her career. Lindsey Toomer Class of 2021 GLIS Major Student Marshal



ABOUT THE GLIS CLASS OF 2021

The Global and International Studies Class of 2021 is a diverse group of undergraduates. There are thirty-one students graduating this semester with twenty earning a bachelor of arts degree and eleven earning a bachelor of science degree. There are eight Paterno Fellows, eight Schreyer Scholars, and eleven students who have earned a high enough grade-point average to graduate with distinction. Those include four graduating with a 3.79 or higher grade-point average and Cum Laude distinction, five with a 3.9 or higher grade-point average and Magna Cum Laude distinction, and two graduating with Summa Cum Laude distinction—Noelle Musolino with a 4.0 grade-point average and Allie Ryave with 3.99 grade-point average. Many graduates were double majors with one or more minors while also studying abroad, completing internships, and participating in undergraduate research.
