Program Overview

My study abroad experience through IAU included a regular semester of 15 credits taken at a university affiliated with schools from across the United States, allowing me to meet American students all while living in town with a French host family. We followed a French grading scale and a typical French semester schedule, allowing us to participate in cultural holidays and events throughout the spring. IAU offers a variety of classes, so I was able to take a full course load to advance my degree while abroad.

Semester Highlights

One of the most rewarding parts of going abroad was the opportunity to refine my French language skills. Between living with a host family and navigating a Southern French town, I was able to greatly expand my vocabulary and fine-tune my accent, which was a massive personal accomplishment. Another noteworthy highlight was my ability to travel all around France and surrounding European nations: an exciting experience for any GLIS student. Summer Education Abroad Opportunities

In addition to semester or year-long programs, Penn State Global also provides various education abroad opportunities for students to engage in over the summer. These programs have proven to be helpful to students who have less flexibility in their course requirements but still desire to study abroad, students who prefer a shorter length of time abroad, or for anyone looking to spend their summer taking courses or participating in an internship overseas rather than at home.

Though summer programs are shorter in length, there are still an enormous list of locations to choose from. Summer programs are available in a range of locales: from China to Greece, Italy to Tunisia, The Netherlands to Spain, students of every foreign-language level can find a program that works for them. Certain programs even incorporate multiple cities in one, such as the Ireland Landscaping and Arts program which travels between Ballyvaughan, Dublin, Galway, and Inis Oirr, Ireland. In addition to the flexibility of location, Penn State Education Abroad also offers a variety of program types depending on the experience students are looking for. Penn State students can opt for a Maymester or a summer session, partake in an internship, or take specific classes to advance their degree.

Summer 2023 Abroad Experience

Choosing to partake in a summer abroad experience has many benefits. Third-year student, Emma Bice had the opportunity to engage in a six-week education abroad program in Aix-en-Provence, France. She stated, "I felt like my summer experience was the perfect amount of time. I didn't get home sick or spread my finances too thin, but I still gained life-changing exposure to many new places."

SUMMER INTERNSHIP EXPERIENCE

About Penn State's Center for Global Studies

This summer, I had the opportunity to be one of the Summer interns for Penn State's Center for Global Studies. The Center for Global Studies, otherwise known as CGS, is a National Resource Center (NRC). An NRC is a government-funded organization that works collaboratively with institutions across Penn State to support teaching, research, and programming that advances the University's expertise in global studies and international events.

With the use of grants awarded from the U.S. Department of Education, CGS supports cross-cultural awareness by providing important resources to educators at Penn State, schools in State College, and globally through their website. CGS puts on events on campus such as lectures, luncheons, and movie showings for those who are interested in global studies. The Center also supports the learning of less-commonly taught languages, such as Farsi, Hindi, Arabic, and Swahili. CGS aids professors at Penn State in the promotion of these courses to students. Regarding languages, the Center also awards funds to excellent researchers, both professors and students in foreign language study through the FLAS fellowship, to aid their research further.

My experience

As my first internship, I wasn't sure what to expect with my time at CGS, but throughout the summer I had an extremely valuable experience and had a lot of fun! Since it is the summer, there were no events to sponsor on campus, so the goals of CGS shifted a little bit. Some of my smaller duties included researching other NRCs to look for potential partnerships, aiding in federal grant reporting, and creating flyers to advertise less-commonly taught languages. My main task this summer was to aid in the creation of the CGS Annual Report, which is a long document that summarizes all of the activities, events, and funding that CGS did in the past year. Through the creation of this report, I learned so much about how a National Resource Center is run and about all the complexities of a government-funded organization. My time at CGS was so valuable to not only gain professional experience, but also learn about global events from a different perspective.
