## **ABOUT THE GLIS CLASS OF 2024**

The Global and International Studies class of 2024 is a diverse group of undergraduates. There are thirty-four students graduating this semester with twenty-one earning a bachelor of arts degree and thirteen earning a bachelor of science degree. There are seven Paterno Fellows, thirteen Schreyer Scholars, and six students who have earned a high enough grade-point average to graduate with distinction. Those include two with a 3.85 or higher grade-point average and cum laude distinction, three with a 3.92 or higher grade-point average and magna cum laude distinction, and one graduating with summa cum laude distinction—Olivia Bratton with a 3.98 grade-point average. Olivia is the GLIS Student Marshal and Amanda Mohamed, the College of the Liberal Arts Student Marshal, received the GLIS Top Academic Graduating Student award. 
